GROW A ROW

There are several ways that Easton residents can support this initiative:

- Volunteer to deliver the produce Each driver will spend approximately two hours on Tuesday afternoons (between June 20th September 12th) to visit with up to four Easton seniors.
- Home gardeners can sow an extra row or two of vegetable seeds, with the intention to donate the excess yield to benefit the seniors
- Non-gardeners can purchase extra produce from local farms for donation and drop it off at Shaggy Coos Farm on Tuesdays from June 20th to September 12th.

In its inaugural 2021 season, the Easton "Grow-A-Row" program provided each homebound senior with an average of four pounds of fresh food each week through the generosity of Easton residents and farmers. The program is sponsored by Food Rescue US – Fairfield County, a local non-profit, in partnership with the Easton Municipal Agent for the Aging and the Easton Energy & Environment Task Force.
